RAWI ABDELAL is the Herbert F. Johnson Professor of International Management at Harvard Business School. Abdelal's primary expertise is international political economy, focusing on the politics of globalization and the political economy of Eurasia. His first book, *National Purpose in the World Economy*, won the 2002 Shulman Prize as an outstanding book on the international relations of Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. His second book, *Capital Rules*, explains the evolution of the international financial system's social norms and legal rules. He is currently at work on two projects: *The Fragile State of the World*, which explores the interrelated challenges that undermined the first era of globalization and threatens to destroy the current age of global capitalism, and *The Profits of Power*, which explores the geopolitics of energy in Europe and Eurasia.

SARAH CHAYES is internationally recognized for her innovative thinking on corruption and its implications. She has uncovered the unrecognized reality that severe and structured corruption can prompt international crises, such as religious extremism and violent insurrection. Her trajectory has led from covering the fall of the Taliban for National Public Radio to years of development work in Kandahar during a spiraling insurgency to service to the topmost levels of the U.S. military. As special assistant to the Joint Chiefs of Staff chairman, Adm. Mike Mullen, Chayes focused on Afghanistan, Pakistan, and the countries swept up in the Arab Spring. Chayes has authored several books, including *The Punishment of Virtue: Inside Afghanistan After the Taliban*; *Thieves of State: Why Corruption Threatens Global Security*, which won the 2016 L.A. Times Book Prize; and *On Corruption in America – And What Is at Stake*.

ALEX DE WAAL is Executive Director of the World Peace Foundation and Research Professor at the Fletcher School, Tufts University. He has worked on the Horn of Africa, and on conflict, food security, and related issues since the 1980s as a researcher and practitioner. De Waal served as a senior advisor to the African Union High Level Panel on Sudan and South Sudan. He was listed among *Foreign Policy*'s 100 most influential international intellectuals in 2008, and Atlantic's 29 'brave thinkers' in 2009, and is the recipient of the Royal Anthropological Institute's Huxley Award. De Waal's recent books include *The Real Politics of the Horn of Africa: Money, War and the Business of Power*; *Mass Starvation: The History and Future of Famine*; and *New Pandemics, Old Politics: 200 Years of the War on Disease and its Alternatives*.

DAN DREZNER is a Distinguished Professor of International Politics at the Fletcher School, Tufts University. He is the codirector of Fletcher's Russia and Eurasia program. Previously, he taught at the University of Chicago and the University of Colorado at Boulder, and held positions with Civic Education Project, the RAND Corporation and the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Drezner received fellowships from the Rockefeller Foundation, German Marshall Fund of the United States, Council on Foreign Relations, and Harvard University. Drezner has written seven books, including *The Ideas Industry* and *All Politics is Global*, and edited three others, including *The Uses and Abuses of Weaponized Interdependence*. He has been a regular columnist and contributing editor for *Foreign Policy*, *The National Interest*, and *The Washington Post*.

JOMO KWAME SUNDARAM is a Senior Adviser at the Khazanah Research Institute, a Fellow at the Academy of Science, Malaysia, an Emeritus Professor at the University of Malaya; and a Visiting Fellow at the Initiative for Policy Dialogue, Columbia University. He has advised several governments in Asia and Africa and served as Assistant Secretary-General, UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs, and Assistant Director-General for Economic and Social Development, Food and Agriculture Organization. Jomo received the 2007 Wassily Leontief Prize for Advancing the Frontiers of Economic Thought. He has authored or edited over a hundred books and

produced academic papers and media articles. He was Founding Director of the Institute of Social Analysis and Founding Chair of International Development Economics Associates.

MATTHIAS MATTHIJS holds the Dean Acheson Chair at SAIS and is associate professor of international political economy. His research focuses on the politics of economic crises, the role of economic ideas in economic policymaking, and the politics of regional integration. At SAIS, he teaches courses in international relations and comparative politics, and was twice awarded the Max M. Fisher Prize for Excellence in Teaching, in 2011 and 2015. He is also a Senior Fellow for Europe at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR) and served as the Chair of the European Union Studies Association (EUSA) from 2019 to 2021. Matthijs is the editor (with Mark Blyth) of *The Future of the Euro*, published by Oxford University Press in 2015, and author of *Ideas and Economic Crises in Britain from Attlee to Blair (1945-2005)*, published by Routledge in 2011. The latter is based on his doctoral dissertation, which received the Samuel H. Beer Prize for Best Dissertation in British Politics by a North American scholar, awarded by the British Politics Group of the American Political Science Association (APSA) in 2010.

KENNETH OYE is Professor Emeritus of Political Science and Data Systems and Society at MIT. His work in international relations includes *Cooperation under Anarchy: Economic Discrimination and Political Exchange* and four co-edited volumes on US foreign policy. Oye consulted for the Petersen Institute, UNIDO, US Treasury, Commerce, and EXIM. His work in technology policy examines the risks and benefits of synthetic biology, pharmaceuticals, and the internet. It has resulted in papers in *Nature*, *Science*, *Clinical Pharmacology and Therapeutics*, *Politics and the Life Sciences*, and *Issues in Science and Technology*. Oye is Director of the MIT Program on Emerging Technologies, a faculty affiliate of the Synthetic Biology Center, the Center for Biomedical Innovation, and the Internet Policy Research Initiative; and Chair of the Broad Institute Biosafety Committee.

ADAM SEGAL is the Ira A. Lipman Chair in Emerging Technology and National Security, and Director of the Digital and Cyberspace Policy Program at the Council on Foreign Relations. From April 2023 to June 2024, Segal was a senior advisor in the State Department's Bureau of Cyberspace and Digital Policy, where he led the development of the U. S. International Cyberspace and Digital Policy. Segal was the project director for the CFR-sponsored Independent Task Force report, *Confronting Reality in Cyberspace: Foreign Policy for a Fragmented Internet*. He is the author of *Advantage: How American Innovation Can Overcome the Asian Challenge*; *Digital Dragon: High-Technology Enterprises in China*; and *The Hacked World Order: How Nations Fight, Trade, Maneuver, and Manipulate in the Digital Age*, which describes the increasingly contentious geopolitics of cyberspace.

LUIS VIDEGARAY is a Senior Lecturer at the MIT Sloan School of Management and the Director of MIT AI Policy for the World Project. Before MIT, he served as Mexico's Foreign Minister and Finance Minister, leading Mexico's relationship with the Trump White House, including the successful renegotiation of NAFTA. He is one of the founders of the Lima Group, created to promote regional diplomatic efforts towards restoring democracy in Venezuela, and conducted Mexico's leading role in the UN towards an inclusive debate on AI and other new technologies. As Mexico's Finance Minister, Videgaray led the country's energy liberalization, a telecommunications reform to foster competition in the sector, tax reform that reduced dependence on oil revenues, and the drafting of Mexico's new Fintech Law. He was named Finance Minister of the Year by *The Banker* and *Euromoney* and a Leading Global Thinker by *Foreign Policy*.

EDWARD YOU is the Founder and Principal of EHY Consulting LLC, a firm specializing in the security, policy, and strategic implications of emerging technologies. Through EHY Consulting, he advises industry, academia, and government on the convergence of artificial intelligence, biotechnology, quantum, and other disruptive technologies, helping organizations navigate the risks and opportunities that will define the future innovation landscape. You recently retired after more than two decades of distinguished service in the FBI, where he held leadership positions at the intersection of counterintelligence, biosecurity, and technology protection. Most recently, he served in the FBI's National Counterintelligence Task Force, supporting a whole-of-government approach to safeguarding emerging and disruptive technologies. You served for 15 years in the Weapons of Mass Destruction Directorate. He also completed a Joint Duty Assignment at the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, where he served as the National Counterintelligence Officer for Emerging and Disruptive Technologies.
